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

I would like to introduce you to my unusual life and give you my strange story. It is quirky.

Hitch-hiking from Sweden to Morocco and from New York to Lima Peru, as a vagabond sleeping-rough on \$1 a day. Running with the bulls in Pamplona. Married on the Navaho Indian reservation at Standing Rock New Mexico to a girl from New Mexico who I met while I was drawing in the Alhambra Gardens in Granada Spain. Buying an 8-meter-long dugout canoe on the Rio de la Passion, Guatemala, paddling to live with the indigenous people along the river during the civil war. Arrested at gun point at the border of El Salvador and Nicaragua during their war and later taken in by a wonderful local family. Built a Bali-style studio retreat in the rainforest at Tamborine Queensland Australia where I was based to tour the country, teaching my art to Tiwi Islands, Ipswich, Beaudesert, and Weipa indigenous communities.

My paintings like my life are full of fun. I am always looking for the adventure in my day, and the paintings tell the story. My exhibitions and collections include Library of Congress archives for the New Mexico Arts Commission, actor Elizabeth Taylor, the King of Thailand, Alaska State Museum, Queensland Performing Arts Center, Barcaldine Museum, many schools of the Queensland Education Department, Queensland Arts Council numerous tours and many exhibitions with galleries in the USA and Australia.

The paintings are about the weird and delicious side of life in our weird world. I endeavour to get a reaction and tell a story. Maybe a laugh.

News From Members

Best Watercolour Cairns Art Society Prize

Tony Walker was awarded Best Watercolour Painting, Cairns Art Society 76th Annual Art Awards for the watercolour on paper 'Quinkan Country'.

This piece evolved from several days' plein air painting in that unique, rugged environment west of Cairns amongst the escarpments and invaluable ancient rock art. Nice to know this painting will stay in Cairns as an acquisitive prize with Cairns Art Society. Thanks also to sponsors Exemplar Coaches & Limousines.

About Quinkan Country

The name 'Quinkan' is understood to mean 'spirit person depicted in rock paintings'. The heritage-listed Quinkan Country is a rugged sandstone plateau near Laura township about 2 hours west of Cairns. The Quinkan area feels surprisingly remote despite

being not so far from Cairns, Mareeba and Cooktown. The scenery features spectacular rock formations and escarpments, extensive eucalypt bushland and some amazing rock art locations.

I was lucky enough to get to Laura for a few days prior to the Australian Watercolour Muster event in Cairns last year. I camped at Laura and made day trips to the nearby 'Split Rock' art site. The weather was ferociously hot but I managed a number of plein air watercolour half sheets and charcoal drawings, climbing the steep track up to Split Rock and finding shade to paint behind the giant rock formations!

Not far from Laura is the heritage listed Old Laura Homestead, dating from about the 1870s. Along with interesting relatively recent European history, including the pastoral industry of Laura Station, there is a very long occupation history of aborigines. The Quinkan rock art is dated to 27,000 BP and aborigine occupation to 34,000 BP. The rock art is a powerful voice from past eras. The rock art became well known in recent times through the work of prominent archaeologists and the artwork of Percy Trezise and others.

In my Quinkan paintings I have aimed to evoke connection to both the landscape and the ancient history, seeking to present authenticity rather than the picturesque. I'm honoured to have been awarded the prize for watercolour at Cairns Art Society 76th Annual Art Awards this year for my full sheet watercolour 'Quinkan Country'.

Catherine Porter - Recent Paintings

I like painting minimalistic a lot of the time. It follows on from my work at Research School of Biological Sciences at the Australian National University. I often used pen and ink working with the aid of an electron microscope, to illustrate very small sections of fauna and flora. I can't quite get out of the habit!

BOM - The main purpose of this painting was to show drought, and secondly to show how much reliance farmers and graziers have on forecasting, hence the looking at BOM on his phone. Everyone off the land is the same. It is the foremost thing on people's mind. The background colours are showing dryness, washed out.

Misty Harbour - This painting is of a harbour or fjord in Norway. The fishing fleet, the mist, and soft colours in the background with more details of the white boat and sheds toward the front with their reflections.

Vase of Australian Natives - The flowers, the vase and the shadow are all important. No other background was necessary, I thought. Catherine's paintings: - BOM, Misty Harbour, Vase of Australian Natives.







Juana Bernardo - Art and Poetry

Just for a bit of fun, I have been collaborating online with an artist friend of mine, Tony Rozario, from Vancouver Island, BC, who does the most amazing calligraphy. I have taken inspiration from some of my art and put it to poetry and Tony has written the poems up with his exquisite calligraphy. While I was in North America in January, visiting my mother and siblings, Tony came down to the Bay Area and we had quite a busy time doing art.

My plan is to mount one or two paintings with its corresponding poem, or use the poem as an artist statement. All going to plan, I will launch some of these pieces in an upcoming exhibition that I am doing along with Leonie Seabrook, Shruti Kashikar and Paquita Fadden, at the Richard Randall Art Studio mid-April. We also hope to have enough for a 2025 calendar by the end of the year.

Here is one of my paintings below called 'Be Like a Waterfall'. The poem is inspired by my painting and Bruce Lee's essay 'Be like Water'. Tony has presented the same with his calligraphy reminiscent of the shape of a waterfall.

Workshop Reports

Svetlana Trefilova's Abstract Flower Workshop

I recently went to British Institute of Art for a 4-day workshop and did "Abstract flowers". The workshop was run by Svetlana Trefilova, who is an artist of Russian-Ukrainian origin, now living in Brisbane.

This was one of my paintings. I liked it how Svetlana never touches your work but will give you suggestions on how to solve a problem.

Granulation workshop

In early February, I attended a workshop on using granulation medium and granulating paints tutored by Marion Hughes. As many of you will know, Marion was WSQ's workshop coordinator last year. Marion is arranging for a workshop for WSQ members later in 2024, and I strongly recommend going along if you want a challenge and some new techniques to use.

To get the effect, Marion used granulating paints (such as Daniel Smith Lunar Black, Lunar Blue, Lunar Earth, Cerulean, and Buff Titanium) which she mixed to a single cream consistency with Winsor & Newton granulating medium instead of water.



After wetting the back and front of the paper, she applied the paint in places to the composition and then fed in more washes of the paint with granulating medium, or paint and water, or just water. The paper is held at an angle and tilted to allow the paint to flow in a semi-controlled way.


These steps can be repeated a few times until the main composition is complete. Then, as the paint dries, the granulation effect intensifies giving quite remarkable textures, which are wonderful for subjects like rocks, distant mountains, and interesting backgrounds. Marion recommended using a limited palette of colours to avoid getting too muddy. Details can be added on top if needed.

The workshop was most enjoyable, and the effects of the granulation medium are unique and quite magical to watch as they develop. Although you sacrifice control over the medium, the results are lovely and, for me, it showcased the beauty of watercolour in a new way.

Watercolour Classes

Ferie Sadeghi's Beginner Watercolour Class

Ferie Sadeghi started her watercolour beginner's class on February 6th. This year there are many new students in her class. Ferie finds a new subject for each class to explore different techniques and give tips to improve the students' watercolour skills. Learning to paint with watercolour is fun. It teaches you to be patient, and while painting you are distracted from all your other problems! Watercolour is a very fluid and transparent medium. It has the reputation of being a difficult medium to paint with because it can be hard to control, and it is often not possible to correct mistakes. But this is not the whole story. Watercolour is a magical medium: full of delightful surprises.

Ferie teaches her students not to think about the end result, but to enjoy the painting process. Enjoy mixing colours together with lots of water and see what happens. Start with only 3 primary colours and see how many tones and values you can come up with. Instead of learning to control the watercolour fluidity, learn to know your medium and see what it can do for you. And most importantly, don't lose your light, which comes from the white paper in your painting.

8-week Beginner Watercolour Course 2024 with Ferie Sadeghi, April 23 - June 11

The Watercolour Society of Queensland is offering an 8 week beginner watercolour course. This course is for beginners who want to learn watercolour techniques, washes and layering. You will learn how to easily paint vibrant flowers, birds and landscapes, and learn techniques such as simplifying shapes and negative painting. We will give you easy watercolour projects to accomplish in the class.
